Remember: we need to look after nature, so when on your scavenger hunt only collect natural things that you find on the ground.

Accessibly: this trail is mostly flat and on gravel paths. It is wheelchair and pram friendly.

Join Millie, Archie and Mum on this nature themed quest and tick off things as you go.




"Smell that fresh air!" Mum exclaimed as they headed towards the Nature Centre.

Play the Animal Bingo game from the back of this booklet!

When you reach the bridge, solve Millie's rhyming riddle to work out what she can see:

"BINGO!" Archie bellowed. "It's a squirrel. Actually, I know a *nutty* fact about squirrels from a documentary," he quipped. "Their teeth never stop growing. How weird is that?"

Just then, they came to a clearing which looked out over the lake. "What a beautiful view across the lake!" said Mum. "Let's sit on this bench for a moment to admire the view."

Take a mindful moment:

Notice or draw five things you can see

Notice <u>four</u> things you can hear

Notice three things you can smell

Notice two things you can touch

Notice one thing you are grateful for and why

Take one deep breath in and out

Now continue the fun!

"That was a great plan, Mum," said Archie. Leaves and twigs crunched underfoot as they continued along the curving path.

"There are tonnes of different types of leaves here," Archie noticed. "I've got a spiky brown one, a lime-coloured fern and a heart-shaped emerald one. And I've found some little sticks."

He held them up for Mum and Millie to see. "I could use them as legs in my bug collage."



"Talking of creepy crawlies," said Millie. "There's a worm wiggling about in the earth off the path."

"BINGO!" they yelled in unison, before doing a wiggly worm dance.

OVER TO YOU!

Get arty with bark. While Millie, Mum and Archie are busy wiggling, get busy making some bark art. TOP TIP: if you find a loose piece of bark on the ground, put it in your scavenger bag.

- 1. Find a dry tree trunk.
- 2. Press a piece of paper onto the bark.
- 3. Rub a pencil over the paper.
- 4. Experiment with different tree trunks and pressure.

Once they'd finished doing their wiggly dance, Archie, Millie and Mum carried on along the path all the way around the lake. Just before they got to the car park and Ford Green Hall again, they found a huge grassy area that looked over the lake.

"Look a feather! Thats on our list" cried Millie.

OVER TO YOU!

You're nearly there questers. Take a breather with one of these calming challenges.

TOP TIP: if you don't have a feather or a leaf just use your imagination.

Floating breath – put a feather or small leaf on the palm of your hand and breathe in through your nose. How softly can you blow so it moves but doesn't fly off your hand? Then blow the feather so it gently floats away.

Breathe like a bee - breathe in through your nose, then buzz like a bee as you breath out.

Don't forget: keep an eye out for things on your list.



"Wow, what an adventure! I've seen so many cool animals but I reckon it's time to count up what we've collected," said Archie.

"Let's lay everything out on the grass," Millie suggested.

"Great work, it looks like we've scavenged some wonderful bits," said Mum. "Now, let's get crafty and use these things to make some nature art on this grass."

"Great idea!" chorused the twins.

With that, Mum, Millie and Archie found a huge open space and started their nature pictures for others to find.

What a perfect way to finish their summer scavenger hunt.

Here are some fun activities to try at home.

Countryside Craft

Transform your scavenged items into pieces of art. For example, if you found a round pebble, you could paint it to look like a ladybird or a mouse. Or you could take inspiration from Millie and turn leaves and petals into a beautiful butterfly. Or how about making an insect with twigs for legs, like Archie suggested?

Wild Words

Write a nature-themed acrostic poem about your Story Quest scavenger hunt. An acrostic poem is a poem where the first letter of each line spells out the word the poem is about, like this example about a tree:

Towering oak stands tall

Rough bark crumbles

Every gust makes green leaves fall

Every acorn tumbles

Animal Bingo Challenge

How to play:

- Every time you see an animal or insect in real life or in the story, check to see if it's on the bingo card
- 2. Do the matching activity

Blackbird bounce



Flap your arms like a bird and bounce up and down for 30 seconds

Spider scuttle



Hold a squat and move your feet quickly on the spot for 30 seconds

Sitting duck



Sit in a squat for 30 seconds

Swan stretch □



Reach up to the sky, take a deep breath and slowly stretch from side to side

Bullfinch balance



Stand on one leg and hold a Superman pose for 30 seconds

Butterfly wings



Do star jumps for 30 seconds, sweeping your arms up and down like wings

Squirrel spring



Squirrels can jump up to 3 metres between trees! See how far you can jump

Wiggly worm



Do Millie and Archie's wiggly worm dance for 30 seconds

Ant arms \square



Ants can lift up to 10 times their own weight! See how many press ups you can do in 30 seconds
